About The College

History Of Umeschandra College

At a logical stage in this process of growth and development these different Units of the College were converted with effect from June 11, 1961, into independent colleges governed by separate Governing Bodies but under the ultimate control of a Central Council in matters of Policy, co-operation and co-ordination.

The Surya Sen Street branch has two units — Morning and Evening imparting instructions in B. Com. (Pass & Honours) courses. These Units were known as City College Commerce Department Surya Sen Street Evening Unit and Morning Unit. The Morning Unit was separately affiliated to CU in 1961 as Umeschandra College.

Though formed into a separated institution Umeschandra College has retained the features of the commerce department and provision of curricular and extracurricular facilities has been continued.

The College is housed in a commodious building. In addition to lecture theatres and tutorial rooms, the college possesses a big library hall, a reading room and a well-equipped museum and commercial laboratory. The Vocational section is affiliated to the Board of Commercial Education, West Bengal and imparts instruction in Shorthand and Typewriting.

Located in the central position of the city, the college is within easy reach by public transport. As the college is close to B. B. D. Bag and main business centres of the city, persons already employed can work in their offices after college hours.

In 1990 the Commerce Department of the City Group of Colleges (1939-1989) completed fifty years and celebrated Golden Jubilee year. The College fondly remembers Mr. Arun Kumar Sen, the Chief Architect of Commerce Group of Colleges and a pioneer in the field of commerce education in Bengal.

City College, Calcutta was one of the oldest first graduate college in Bengal.

History of the Commerce Department

City College, Calcutta is one of the oldest first grade Colleges in Bengal. It was founded in the Year 1939 by a group of pioneers like Ananda Mohan Bose. It has a long record of brilliant results and can claim as its alumni many great and noble sons of India.

The Commerce Section of the College was inaugurated in the year 1939. It has since expanded into eight units, housed in three separate buildings.

Invited modestly as a Department of the Parent college on July 18, 1939 the Surya Sen Street (then Mirzapur Street) Evening Unit proved an immediate success. In 1941-42 Morning Classes were started at the same centre to be followed in 1945-49 by another Evening Unit located at the building of the parent institutions at 102/1, R. R. M. Sarani (Amherst Street). Owing to riots, arrangements for the Day Classes were made in 1946-47 at the Amherst Street building. An emergency branch at South Calcutta was also started in the same year and this Branch gradually grew into a centre with separate Units such as, morning classes for women students, day classes for commerce and arts students (Male).

The unique feature of the Commerce Department of City College is that all the Units are self-contained. Forces of circumstance led to the expansion of the institution; but at every stage, the constant endeavour of the College Authorities has been to further the interest of education.

Besides providing the usual arrangements for class-room teaching, the College Authorities found it possible to equip a vast Library and a Commercial Museum (with Laboratory facilities). Practical basis was secured by practice and demonstration classes. Arrangements for Audio-visual Instruction (including Video and OHP) have been introduced to make teaching more effective and scientific.

The success of these arrangements has amply been borne out by the long and sustained record of brilliant achievements of the students in this College at all University Examinations.

Capability of the students to make decisions at personal & professional level will increase after completion of this course. Students can independently start up their own business. Students can get thorough knowledge of finance and commerce. The knowledge of different specializations in Accounting, costing, banking and finance with the practical

4. Rules and Regulations

The principal invites the co-operation of the students and their guardians in the creation and the maintenance of an atmosphere conducive to academic and cultural development, and in upholding the traditions of the institution. Students are especially invited to cooperate, in their own interest with their elected Class Representative to ensure enforcement of rules regarding discipline.

Admission of a student in this College implies adherence to the prescribed code of conduct and observance of the rules laid down by the College. Any student who fails to abide by these rules will be strictly dealt with.

Admission and Registration

- i. The admission process starts immediately after declaration of Class XII results of the various Boards.
- ii. The admission form fill-up process is strictly online and in accordance with the rules and regulations of the University of Calcutta. Admission to the college is granted to students as per Govt. norms and C.U. norms.
- iii. The Registration of valid students is as per the norms of the University of Calcutta.

Academic and Classroom Discipline

- i. Students must be punctual and regular in attending classes, tutorials, class tests examinations etc. Failure to obtain the required attendance percentage, non-submission of assignments and unjustified absence from tests /examinations will be treated as breaching the code of conduct.
- ii. Student must be seated in their classrooms at the beginning of each period. They must not enter or leave the class room without permission of the lecturer.
- iii. Impersonation during roll call is a punishable offence.
- iv. Use of Mobile Phone during class hours is prohibited and is liable for punishment.

- v. Resorting to any kind of malpractice (copying, impersonation, use of unfair means, exchanging answer-sheets) during examinations will not be tolerated and will be dealt with severely.
- vi. Students should carefully follow the Notices put up on the Notice Board (both online and offline). No excuse will be considered if Notices on the Board are ignored.
- vii. When a lecturer is absent or is unable to take class, students should maintain a strict order among themselves so as to not disturb the adjoining classes. Under no circumstances should they leave the classroom without ascertaining the relieve orders from the Staff room.

Behavioural Discipline or Codes of Conduct in College Premises – Do's and Don'ts

- i. Students are expected to treat the members of the staff both teaching and non-teaching and their fellow students with courtesy both in and outside the College. Students shall not, by their act or conduct, cause damage to the reputation of the institution.
- ii. Students are expected to come to college dressed suitably maintaining decency.

1. Admission Norm

Eligibility for Online Application Under University of Calcutta for the Session 2023-24

Three-Year B. Com courses of studies (under CCF, 2022).

- These shall apply to every student prosecuting the above Courses in this University.
- Notwithstanding anything contained in any other regulations or rules for the time being in force the study for the above Courses shall be guided by these Regulations effective from the Academic Session 2023- 2024.

1. Title and Commencement

- 1.1 These Regulations shall be called THE REGULATIONS FOR SEMESTER WISE Four-Year B.Com. Honours or Honours with Research / Three-Year B. Com Degree Programme under CCF (CURRICULUM AND CREDIT FRAMEWORK), UNIVERSITY OF CALCUTTA.
- 1.2 These Regulations shall come into force with effect from the academic session 2023-2024.

2. Duration of the Programme

The Four-year B.Com. Honours/ Honours with Research Programme shall be for a minimum duration of eight (08) (with an exit option after completion of 2nd/4th/6th semester) consecutive semesters of six months each, i.e. The odd semester will start ordinarily in the month of July and the even semester in the month of January of every year.

Three-year B,Com. Programme shall be for a duration of six (with an exit option after completion of 2nd/4th semester) consecutive semesters of six months each, i.e. The odd semester will start ordinarily in the month of July and the even semester in the month of January of every year. A candidate prosecuting a regular course of study for semester wise degree course shall have to clear all

semesters in all respect within a span of seven years from the year of admission to the particular course and combination, failing which enrolment of the candidate shall stand cancelled.

Explanation: A student already admitted in this course may seek fresh admission with different course subject to clause no 4

3. Applicability of the Regulations:

- a) These regulations shall be applicable to the students taking admission to the B.Com. (Four-Year B.Com. Honours or Honours with Research / Three-Year B. Com Degree) Course from the academic session 2023-2024.
- b) Students who have already successfully completed any U.G. degree earlier are not eligible to take admission into above course.

I-Admission Regulations

4.(a) A candidate who has passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) or its equivalent Examination is eligible to seek admission to the 1st year of the Four-Year B.Com. Honours or Honours with Research / Three-Year B.Com Degree Course of Studies provided he/she has also passed in English having full marks not being less than 100 and fulfils the conditions as laid down in clause 5, 10, 11 and 12.

Students who have passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) Vocational Examination in Business and Commerce conducted by the West Bengal State Council of Vocational Education and Training shall be eligible to seek admission to the first year of the three-year B. Com course of studies under this University.

However, no candidate shall be allowed to take admission after a lapse of more than 3 years from the year of passing the previous qualifying examination.

(Explanation: The year of admission shall not be taken into account while calculating three years from the year of passing the previous qualifying Examination).

4. (b) Students who have passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) Examination or its equivalent from the All-India Boards/Councils (i.e. CBSE, ISC and National Institute of Open Schooling) need not require to submit the Migration Certificate for getting Registration under this University.

- 5.For the purpose of determining eligibility for admission to the Four-Year B.Com. Honours or Honours with Research / Three-Year B.Com Degree Courses, aggregate marks shall be calculated by adding the marks in top-four subjects in order of marks secured by a candidate. However, marks in compulsory Environmental Education/Studies shall not be taken into account for calculation of aggregate marks. However, if the subject "Environmental Science" is studied as an elective subject of 100 marks, it may be taken into account for the purpose of determining the aggregate marks.
- (a) A student taking up Four-Year B.Com. Honours or Honours with Research Course of study in a subject

must have obtained: i. A minimum of 50% marks in the aggregate and 45% marks in the subject or related subject at the previous qualifying examination.

Or

- ii.55% marks in the subject or related subject at the previous qualifying examination.
- (b) However, students belonging to the scheduled caste or scheduled tribe community taking up 4-year honours course of study must have obtained a minimum of 40% marks in the aggregate or 40% marks in the subject or related subject at the previous qualifying examination, as the case may be.
- (c) Related subjects: Accountancy, Business Economics including Business Mathematics, Business Organization, Mathematics, Business Mathematics, Economics, Statistics, Business Studies, Office & Secretarial practice, Financial Accounting, Elements of Cost Accountancy and Auditing, Book keeping, Commerce, Cost Accountancy and Principles of Management, Commercial Law and Preliminaries of Auditing, Costing & Taxation.
- (d) A student taking up three-year B. Com course of study must fulfil eligibility conditions stated in clause no. 4 (a) only of the regulations.
- (e)Seat reservation for admission in the first-year class of four-year Honours (eight semesters)/ Three-year (six semesters) B.Com. courses of studies shall be guided by the West Bengal State Higher Educational Institutions Reservation in Admission), Act, 2013 and the West Bengal State Higher Educational Institutions (Reservation in Admission) Rules, 2014 and Memorandum No. 339-Edn (CS)/OM-74L/2023, dt.26.05.2023.

Infrastructure

MAN

A. Main Campus

College Building

The main campus in Surya Sen Street has five storey building, the front part of which is the old building, now recognized as heritage. The rear part is comparatively new. We have an extended Campus in Salt Lake, where academic Session started from 2010. Located on the lap of lush greenery, the College building at the second campus is more specious than that of the main campus.

Class Rooms

Both the main and extended Campus have spacious classroom equipped with green boards, table, chair, adequate number of benches, lights, fans, large windows and doors.

Library

Our college has a big, spacious library with huge collection of books on commerce and literature, journals and magazines. It also provides IT facilities with three LAN connected computers and sitting accommodation for reading during the library hours (8 am - 12 pm). There is a Library in the Second Campus, though smaller in Size.

IT Facilities

Apart from the Computers in Library in the main campus, we have computer laboratories in both campuses, equipped with modern desktop computers connected by LAN.

Common Room

In the main campus there is a large common room with indoor games facilities. In the second campus there are two common rooms, one for boys and the other for girls.

Seminar Hall

We have a big seminar hall equipped with projector, screen, microphone, adequate sitting accommodation and AC machine.

In Man

Hostel

Our college has no separate hostels of our own but one in college row shared by the city group of colleges. There is no girls hostel accommodation as of now.

Canteen

Both the campuses have canteens. Delicious nutritious and mostly veg. items are sold at reduced price.

Other Facilities

We have blue star water purifier and proper toilet and sanitation for students.

B. Extended Campus

The Extended Campus of Umeschandra College at Salt Lake is a two-storied building situated upon a sprawling, extremely spacious land. The ground is covered with lush greenery which attracts the eye. Classes start here at 7:00am.

College Library

The Extended Campus at Salt Lake can boast about a pretty big library with quite a huge collection of books and journals. Syllabus oriented text books are also provided from the library for both the teachers as well as the students. The students can use the books of the library for their academic purposes and for any kind of reference work, which may be required. The library remains open till 1:00pm for the benefit of both the teachers as well as the students.

Computer Lab and IT Facilities

The college has LAN-Connected Computers, Barcode printer, Barcode Scanner and a few general printers. WIFI facility is available within the college premises including the Computer Lab, Library and the Staff Room. We also have CCTV

facilities within the Principal's Room and within the Staff Room and in the entire college premises where ever it is required.

Website of the College

The CMS-based Website of the college is maintained with secured encrypted connections, and it is updated mostly on a regular basis.

G-Suite Platform

This facility is used by the college to conduct online classes, internal examinations, etc. G-Suite administrators provide round-the-clock assistance, security and administrative control, and other services like virtual meetings.

Online Admission

The college website gives access to the student's information, Fees collection, Feedback system, Helpline system, etc.

Collection of Fees from Students

Students pay their fees online using gateway Razor-Pay, which accepts net-banking, credit card, debit card, UPI, etc.

Online Examination

This platform is utilised for uploading of question papers, answer-sheet submission by the students, checking of the papers, marks entry, etc.

Common Room

Separate Common Rooms are provided for the male and female students at the Salt Lake Campus. The rooms are large enough and they provide indoor games facilities.

Seminar Hall

We have a very large Seminar Hall with LCD projector and screen, white board system, microphones, adequate sitting accommodation and AC machines. The Seminar Hall at the Salt Lake Campus can hold approximately a huge number of

teachers and students and it has got spacious sitting arrangements so that seminars can be conducted well without a feeling of suffocation.

College Canteen

The Extended Campus has a very nice canteen to cater to the requirements of both the teachers as well as the students. So, early in the morning, when practically no food is available outside the campus, our canteen comes to our rescue. The canteen provides us with good food which is prepared hygienically and the cost is pretty pocket-friendly and the quality is not compromised because of the reasonable cost. Our Honourable Principal is cautious enough to keep a random check on the quality of food and the prices. This is done on practically a regular basis, in order to make food affordable at a reasonable rate for both the teachers as well as the students.



Student Amenities

1. Students' Representative Body

It is good to communicate the opinions of students as ultimately Students' Representative Body of Umeschandra College are built around making the voices of students heard. Paying attention to student voices is at the crux of a successful Students' Representative Body.

The Students' Representative Body in Umeschandra College is mainly a body of students who help out students in various ways.

Along with this the Students' Representative Body also arranges a number of activities on behalf of the college. Activities like Blood Donation Camps, College Excursion Tours, Freshers' Welcome, Teachers' Day Celebration, Farewell Parties, Iftar Parties so on and so forth. Furthermore, student unions organize and support numerous activities such as debates, demonstrations, educational lectures, cultural and artistic events and so on

2. Placement and Career counselling Cell

Students have a lot of decisions to make while they're in college. These range from which courses to take up apart from their core subjects, to deciding which internships would benefit their career. As a matter of fact, almost every other choice that a student makes in college revolves around his/her plans after college, be it studying further or taking up a job.

A cultural programme is organised every year to mark the birthday of the celebrated writer Munshi Premchand. It is a week-long affair that is held in two stages i.e., Prelims -wherein students compete in various categories such as Essay-Writing, Singing, Dancing etc. to secure a place in the final round. -and Finals where the top 16 students across categories compete for the winning prize. The winners are felicitated on 31stJuly, the birthday of Munshi Premchand by our Honourable Principal

Inter-College Competitions

Students visit other college and institutions to participate in various competitions that are held from time to time. A few notable mentions are Bengal Music Fair 2019 (a musical programme organised by the Govt. of West Bengal an initiative to showcase Bengal's musical and cultural heritage to the world, as well as to revive dying folk musical forms from various parts of West Bengal.) Xavotsav 2020, Ripples etc.

NSS

The NSS unit at Umeschandra College has made a significant effort to encourage students to participate actively in the NSS unit's various programmes. Under the direction of the College NSS Unit various initiatives such as Blood donation camps, health check-up camps, social outreach programmes were organised by the college.

5. Library

Umeschandra College was previously named as City College of Commerce. The then City College of Commerce had two units – Morning Unit and Evening Unit. The Commerce Section of the College was inaugurated in the year 1939. In 1941-42, Morning classes were started. The two units had one Library that was City College of Commerce Library. The Morning unit was separately affiliated to CU

in 1961 as Umeschandra College. In the year 1964, the library was separated from the Evening unit.

The Umeschandra College Central Library is situated on the 1st Floor of the College. The College has an extended Campus in Salt Lake. A small Library was established there in 2011 as a branch Library of the Central Library. Manual Lending system was introduced in Campus Library in the same year. Besides the books Issue/Return system, all Library activities of the Campus Library are controlled by the Central Library of the UCC.

The library has more than 30,000 books (according to Accession Register). 4 Newspapers, 2 Journals and 8 Magazines are purchased by the library on regular basis. Besides these, 4 career-oriented magazines and 1 career oriented newspaper are purchased regularly for students so that they make prepare themselves for different competitive examinations.

Besides the syllabus books, the UCC Library is also enriched with the old books on Economics, Political Science, Law, bound volume old journals etc. The library has good collection of Reference books, Carrier Guidance books. Every year some English and Bengali Literature books are purchased by the library to extend the knowledge of the student on Indian Culture and Literature.

The library is a member of UGC-NLIST Consortium.

An average of 30 students uses the library regularly. Teachers and Non-Teaching staff members also use the library on daily basis.

The whole Library is under the surveillance of CCTV.

The Computerization / Retro-Conversion work of books has been started from 14.01.2023.

5.1 Library Opening Hours

The library is opened from 6.30 am to 12.30 pm from Monday to Friday and 6.30 am to 10:30 am on Saturday except Sunday and other Holidays.

5.2 Library Services

Both Open and Close Access System have been maintained simultaneously in the library. Students are allowed to choose their books from the shelves. Different services are regularly being rendered such as:

Lending Service:

Students can borrow One book for 7 days. UGC Teachers may issue 10 books at a time. SACT Teachers may issue 6 books and Non-Teaching Staff members may borrow 4 books at a time.

Newspaper, Magazines, Career Guidance books and journals:

Students, Teachers and other staff members may read Magazines, Newspapers, Career Guidance books and journals, Reference books in the Reading Room.

Reference Service:

All members including Students, Teachers and Non-Teaching Staff members are provided required reference service.

WEBOPAC:

We have introduced KOHA Library Management Software in the cloud from 2021. Anybody may search for books, Rare books and bound volume journals of UCC Library at any time through KOHA OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue). Remote access facilities for E-books and E-journals: The Library is a member of UGC-NLIST (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content) Consortium for accessing e-resources. Students can access different e-journals and e-books from NLIST. Remote access facility is provided to students for using NLIST.

Book Bank:

Book Bank facility is provided to 6th Semester students.

Internet Service:

Wi-Fi facility is available to all members of the library.

New Arrivals:

The lists of newly purchased books are provided in the New Arrivals platform under the library section of UCC website.

Digital Library:

Some OPEN ACCESS E-RESOURCES are available in the Digital Library platform under the library section of UCC website.

Digital Archive:

Previous Years Internal Question Papers of UCC and Previous Years University (University of Calcutta) Question Papers are provided in the Digital Archive platform under the library section of UCC website.


(E) The number of working days
